## Partner with Us! Together, we will find a solution for every learning need!

Whew! We are half-way through the 2016-17 school year! This means students and teachers have half of the school year to continue doing what is working with regard to learning and achievement. This also means students and teachers have half of the year to improve upon what is not working well. Our goal is to empower each student to reach proficiency with all learning standards. *Sometimes students may need a little help this time of year. If this is true for you, please consider the following options:* 

- **Contact your CARES teacher** Our CARES program provides a teacher mentor for each student and parent/guardian. When tricky issues arise, communicating with your CARES teacher is usually the first step as we discover solutions.
- **Contact a teacher or staff member you trust.** All teachers and staff members are ready, willing and able to help students and parents/guardians to explore ideas and solutions to support you. Many teachers offer academic support for students during lunch and/or after school.
- **Contact your principals.** Meeting the needs of students and parents/guardians is extremely important to me, Principal Everson and to Assistant Principal Mark Anderson. Students and parents/guardians are encouraged to visit with one or both of us. You may visit in person or communicate by telephone or email.
- **Contact your guidance counselor.** Ms. Horner or Mr. Mountin have potential solutions for every problem! Don't hesitate to consult with our counselors. Success with learning and achievement at school is an important part of our job here at MMS!
- Explore our MMS website and MMS Team pages. Many teachers use technology to provide helpful blogs, spaces, and educational links to help students and parents/guardians understand learning standards and assignments.
- Review the weekly progress reports provided via email or paper form. Students are required to send parents/guardians a progress report each Wednesday. Progress reports include information about current assignments, grades received, and what assignments might be missing. This is a great way to stay connected with middle school achievement on a weekly basis. Students with missing assignments discovered on Wednesdays are automatically ushered into our Golden Opportunity hour on Thursday mornings with expert teachers to complete those missing assignments and receive necessary help.
- Utilize Family Access. Skyward Family Access is an online grading tool that enables students and parents/guardians to view grading practices per course. Typically, grades are recorded on a weekly basis. Viewing Family Access regularly avoids a grading surprise at report card time. Parents/guardians must acquire a password code to access this tool. Password codes can be acquired by calling the Technology Department at our district Administrative Center 715-232–1642.
- No concern should go unnoticed! Visit our online Idea Box to share an idea or concern electronically. Or, write a memo to MMS staff and drop it in one of our Idea Boxes located on the walls in our hallways to be found throughout our MMS school building.

- **Students -Get Involved!** Students who participate in extra-curricular activities often find a natural support group of friends and adults to support academic and emotional needs throughout the school year. Teachers, counselors and principals can help you find a sport, club or activity that is right for you! When necessary, we can also support financial need associated with getting involved.
- **Parents/Guardians Get Involved!** Partnering with parents/guardians is very valuable. When our students see relationships forming between home and school, students tend to learn more and achieve at higher levels. MMS invites parents/guardians to participate in conferences, frequent conversations with teachers by telephone, email or appointment, volunteer activities in and out of the classroom, Site Council meetings, Family Night events and more. We are also open to your ideas about how to get involved in our school mission and vision.
- No student should be bored! Does your child need an additional challenge in a course or two? Don't be shy! Talk to your teachers about alternative learning projects (4 level learning projects) that interest you! Teachers are equipped with a variety of 4 level strategies to meet your learning needs!

Sometimes parents/guardians are unsure how to get involved or get informed at the middle level. This year, we are trying something new!



Believe it or not we are getting ready for registering your 8<sup>th</sup> grade students for high school! There will be many parts to your student's transition to Menomonie High School. Here is a brief synopsis of the dates and times to take note of. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact Mrs. Horner in the Guidance office at 715-232-1673 ext. 30112. We strive to make this is an exciting time for you and your students'.

**\*Week of January 31**<sup>st</sup> MHS Counselors will meet with 8th graders (class of 2021) to introduce and discuss registration process for their freshman year.

\***Monday, February 6**<sup>th-</sup> Curriculum night at MHS in the auditorium from 6:30-7:00pm. This is a meeting for 8th Grade students and their families to hear about the high school registration process. A good opportunity for students and their families to meet teachers, counselors and the administration and to ask any questions they may have.

\* Week of February 6<sup>th</sup>- MHS counselors at middle school for online registration for class of 2021.

**\*February/ March** CARES meetings with Mrs. Horner regarding high school transition information such plans of study, grading, report cards, and activities.

\* **Summer Orientation** -Usually in August Students and parents will receive sign up information about MHS Orientation from the high school in CARES in May

\* **September 1**<sup>st -</sup> The first day of school at MHS is just for Freshmen and parents/guardians will receive information by mail and during school Summer Orientation.

Written messages can be dropped off in our Idea Boxes located in the middle school hallways. Paper forms are available next to each box.

• Send an Email to an Adult You Trust Sending an email to an adult you trust is a safe and easy way to share. We will respond in a timely manner.

All students should feel safe at school! No concern is too small! "Stand up" for yourself and "stand up" for your friends and peers. Together, we can eliminate bullying in our school!

If you have questions about how to use our Skyward grading data base "Family Access", you are not alone. Parents/guardians often have questions or difficulty when navigating this site. To login to Family Access, go to the Parents & Community tab, go to Parent Tools and a drop down menu will come up with Skyward Family Access on it. Click on this option to access Family Access.

#### **Parent/Family Online Access**

Online Family Access is available for all families in the district. To obtain a username and password, contact our district office at (715) 232-1642. Please, for security reasons, do NOT share your parent login with your child. Go to
www.sdmaonline.com and click on the *Family* Access Login link on the left side. You can access your child's attendance, grades, fees and lunch balance.

#### Attendance Reminder



Good school attendance is one predicator of academic success. All Menomonie Middle School students are required to be in attendance from 7:43 am to 2:54 pm. Additionally, students are reminded that they have a maximum of 10 school days that can be missed during the school year for personal illness, religious services, and family activities. If a student needs to attend an appointment during school hours, a note from a parent/guardian or that business office needs to be turned into the Attendance Office the morning of your appointment so we can get your student a pass and that it does not count against those 10 days. If your child is absent, please call the Attendance Office.

Sign up to receive daily announcements, newsletters, and other important updates. The link is available on the middle school website.

Go to Parents & Community, then to Parent Tools. You will see a drop down menu listing Daily Announcements. Click on that link. This will take you to the Middle School Announcements page. On the right side is a Subscribe button. Click on that and follow the prompts.

Please remember to update your information, emergency contacts, and fill out permission forms on Skyward Family Access for your student(s). This is important for field trip permission, student and bus code of conduct, video/photographing permission, computer network agreement, health services standing orders, and more. You can also pay online fees for the middle school and sports fees.

#### Free and Reduced Lunch

Families who may be experiencing financial hardship are encouraged to apply for the free and reduced lunch program. Guidelines change and family circumstances change as well. Applications are available in the middle school office, as well as the district office. Many times, our families are struggling to make "ends meet" and if they are eligible for assistance, it could really help their family. In addition, students who meet free and reduced eligibility are often eligible for other programs. However, if an application is not submitted, they cannot receive that service. ## Yearbooks Price Increase on January 28, 2017

Yes, you can still order a yearbook. The easiest way to order is to log onto Jostensyearbooks.com. The current price is \$23 for a standard yearbook. This price will go up to the final cost of \$25 on Jan. 28, 17. Jostens will accept credit or debit cards and electronic checks online. The **final deadline** for ordering a Yearbook for this year is February 24, 2017.

A second way is to pick up an order form from the front office, or from Mrs. Creviston in room 418. Then, return the form to Mrs. Creviston, or the office, with a check made out to **Menomonie Middle School** or send EXACT cash. **DO NOT** write a check to Jostens, please. Your child's yearbook order will be entered and your child will come home with a receipt a few days later.

Parents and students are invited to share and view Menomonie Middle School photos by going to ReplayIt.com or by downloading the free ReplayIt app available for iPhone and Android. If your child has misplaced something at the Middle School, there is a *Lost and Found* table in the hallway by the office. Please encourage your child to check this location to claim lost items. The PE Dept. has their own *Lost and Found* table in each of the locker rooms. We accumulate many, many items during the year.

#### Notes from the Health Office...



The Health Office is covered by one of the clerical staff. Our clerical staff is not medically trained beyond first aid. There is one school nurse for the entire school district. The Health Office is a space provided for sick or injured students. It is also where medications are safely stored and administered to Middle School students. The Health Office cannot accommodate several students who are ill or need to be picked up. Please provide the office with current work and cell phone numbers.

At this time of year, we have an increase in communicable diseases, especially influenza and gastrointestinal illnesses. Please have your family members pay special attention to preventing these illnesses. We ask you to discuss the following precautions with your child:

- do not share drinking glasses, eating utensils, water bottles or lip applicators
- wash hands before and after using restroom and before handling food

Parents please do not send your child to school if they are ill. If your child has a fever at school, we will contact you to pick them up. Students should be fever free for 24 hours before returning to school. Bed rest, drinking increased amounts of liquids, and taking pain reliever to help reduce the discomfort of illness may help your child feel better.

## Students have the opportunity to go outside during their lunch break, please encourage your child to dress appropriately if spending time outside in the cold temperatures.

A study by Mayo Clinic has found that frequent headaches in children appear to be associated with sleep problems. 4% Of girls and 2% of boys report chronic daily headaches. If your child has frequent headaches, talk with your primary care provider to determine possible causes. It may help to write down how many hours of sleep your child gets each night. If you suspect a link between disturbed sleep and headaches, discuss possible treatment with your care provider. A typical teen needs about 9 hours of sleep per night.

#### **Bridging Brighter Smiles: School-Based Dental Program**



The dental clinic is offering a yearlong program with multiple visits to provide dental care for all children PK-8<sup>th</sup> grade. Dental professionals staff the clinic providing oral health education, supplies and preventive treatment. If you completed a permission slip on the first day of school your child should have received services in November and December. Clinic staff will be returning to the Middle School for follow-up visits for students who are already signed up. Please contact the school office at 715-232-1673 if interested in the dental clinic for your child. Enrollment forms are available if you need these services.
